

Darkroom Contemporary Dance Theatre exists as a vehicle to reimagine dance within contemporary society, through innovation & interdisciplinary collaboration. The company produces works that delight, excite, engage and inspire.

Based in Cape Town, South Africa, Darkroom Contemporary was founded in 2010 by Louise Coetzer and Oscar O'Ryan, with the aim to develop work opportunities for the multitude of talented dancers produced by local training institutions. Coetzer, a dancer and choreographer, and O'Ryan, a photographer and filmmaker, bring together expertise from their respective fields to form a dynamic partnership. Darkroom Contemporary is recognized for delivering innovative, unexpected works of the highest artistic standard, simultaneously creating unique audience experiences and new ways of appreciating dance.

The company regularly stages works in unexpected performance areas, transforming ordinary spaces into intriguing, multi-faceted arenas. Darkroom Contemporary's dance film works sits alongside its performance projects, making the work accessible to a larger global audience through the medium of film and digital media.

Projects spearheaded by the founders provide platforms and creates opportunities for skills development and exchange among all artists involved. Project collaborators include dancers, physical performers, visual artists, sound designers, photographers, filmmakers and digital artists. Darkroom Contemporary has implemented a wide range of performance, film, developmental and educational projects in the Western Cape and Gauteng. The company operates as a non profit organization with the objectives to promote dance, theatre, and dance film through a variety of projects.

ARTISTIC DIRECTORS REPORT

DARKROOM // a space for developing CONTEMPORARY // of the times

During 2021, the global arts community still dealt extensively with the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Lockdown regulations eased but venue and events capacities were still heavily affected. We continued placing our focus on interactive, online and digital projects, as well as projects designed for public spaces void of capacity limitations.

The timing for our major projects worked out well, and we were lucky to not have to issue any cancellations or postponements due to infections. These projects were specifically designed around the COVID limitations, and meant we were able to continue positively impacting beneficiaries through job creation, training, skills development and audience development.

As many arts organisations around the world, the pandemic meant that we needed to find new ways of moving forward in order to continue serving our beneficiaries. Some of the ways in which we overcame these challenges were:

- Focusing on creating dance works that could be presented digitally
- Maximising our existing body of dance film works to further distribute these
- Finding ways to offer educational and inspirational experiences to young people online
- Finding ways to rehearse and perform through online channels
- Connecting with arts festivals that were offering digital platforms for work and artistic discussion
- Connecting with our existing and new partnerships to support each other in this time

Darkroom Contemporary implemented a range of digital and live performance projects, educational workshops and developmental opportunities, and artist discussions. The organisation's digital performance & film works were included in platforms including:

- Kucheza Afrika Festival (South Africa)
- Ubumuntu Arts Festival (Kigali, Rwanda)
- Infecting the City Festival (South Africa)
- FESTV (Edinburgh, Scotland)
- STAND Summer School (Sustaining Theatre & Dance Foundation)
- Denton Black Film Festival (Texas, USA)
- Woordfees TV (South Africa)
- Hangars Numériques (Saint-Denis / La Réunion)

Sharing our artistic output via online spaces, has enabled us to reach a far broader global audience, with online audience reach exceeding the projected number for live audience viewership. Notably, Darkroom Contemporary's dance film Des/Aria won the runner up Jury Award for best screen dance, at the Denton Black Film Festival in Texas, USA.

Of course this has also been a challenging time to implement new creative projects, and the health and safety of the artists involved was always a priority. I am also happy to report that through our strict adherence to safety protocols, our recent projects could be completed without interruptions from any COVID infections among the staff or artists.

During this trying time, supporting grants from National Lotteries Commission, The National Arts Council, SA State Theatre, and Western Cape Government's Department of Cutural Affairs & Sport, enabled Darkroom Contemporary to provide contract based employment opportunities within the arts sector, in a time when many arts jobs had been lost.

I would like to take this opportunity to express our immense gratitude to the Darkroom Contemporary funders and partners, whose support has been a vital lifeline to the artists and organisation during this challenging time.

With gratitude also, to our partner organisation Dance For All SA, who's contribution supported much of our youth development & job creation programmes this year.

We thank you for your investment towards a varied and resilient arts ecosystem !

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

Still reeling from the aftermath of the pandemic, the global village of the creative sector continues to be in a state of uncertainty. Although productions can now perform to audiences at full capacity, promised funding remains elusive. Louise Coetzer and Oscar O'Ryan, despite all the challenges, continue to be an inspiration as trailblazers within thecreative sector. They have seized opportunities where others saw none and continue to weave their special brand of magic around every turn.

Gatherings, up until very recently, remained limited because of the pandemic and restrictions continued to impact planning and the implementation of projects throughout the year. Darkroom seamlessly found new ways to service existing beneficiaries and entice new audiences into their world where they comfortably inhabit the virtual arena with presentations beguiling audiences locally, nationally, and internationally. As the Board, we remain proud of the passion, commitment, courage and tireless efforts of Louise, Oscar, the artists (performing, visual, filmmakers and others) and various collaborators in their boundless determination to present stellar dance theatre that is current, relevant, innovative, and accessible. As the Chairperson, I am in awe of it all.

Despite all challenges, notably, the non-payment of funds pledged by Mzansi Golden Economy, Darkroom Contemporary has rallied, hustled, and remained true to its vision and mission. The list of works, collaborations, dance films, talk-shops, classes, job creation opportunities and skills development pay testimony to the unbridled work ethic promulgated by Darkroom. A big shout-out also goes to all collaborators who are always welcoming and supportive. As the Board, we remain painfully aware that the quest for self-sustainability. The need for financial stability is very real and often, is great cause for concern. The company, by virtue of how it operates and is managed, constantly seeks to find ways to minimise costs and maximise income.

To all at Darkroom, we commend you. During the forthcoming year, may you continue to display resilience, hope and steadfast belief in your capacity to persevere and grow for the survival of your art form.

Coetzer approaches dance making as a medium for narrative and connection - that of the bodies within space, but also with the aim of connecting dance as art form to the world outside the studio or theatre, and to other art forms. This act of connecting the dance making process to that of another artistic language has inspired, and often demanded constant new approaches to the work, and spills over into her sitespecific performance and dance film projects.

MEMORYHOUSE is a physical exploration of the subconscious - seeking to connect the inner workings of memory and consciousness to the palpable realm. Memoryhouse visits these various 'sites' of memory, some dreamlike, others traumatic, many fractured - as if paging through layers of thought - archive - imprint - translucent pages bound by repetition. The work immerses the viewer in a dreamscape where the tension between reality and remembering collides in an infinite loop.

The Denton Black Film Festival is the brainchild of Harry Eaddy, festival director, and is presented by the Denton African American Scholarship Foundation. In 2014, Harry Eaddy approached two staples of the Denton community – Cheylon Brown and Mesha George – with a unique idea to bring an event focused on Black cinema to the region. Together, the trio began dreaming up an event that would evolve into the festival thousands enjoy today. Not long after Eaddy and his fellow founding organizers began collaborating, the Denton African American Scholarship Foundation came onboard as the festival's founding sponsor.



The Creative Practices Lab is a platform for experimentation, exchange, reflection and communitybuilding among artists. It is an open and intensive residency platform aimed to generate new strategies and ideas in experimental and interdisciplinary performance practice.

The CPLab engaged with 15 artists during a 10 - day facilitated process, guided by interdisciplinary artists Louise Coetzer, Marius Jansen van Vuuren, Obakeng Kgwasi, Gavin Krastin, and Alan Parker.

Louise Coetzer was the lead facilitator of the lab, and shared a presentation on Darkroom Contemporary's tech based & interdisciplinary work with the lab participants.

DANCE FOR ALL DANCE/FILM WORKSHOP

DATE: 16 August - 9 September 2021 VENUE: DANCE FOR ALL SA

IMPACT: 7 YOUTH BENEFICIARIES OUTCOMES: EDUCATIONAL PRESENTATION, CAPACITY BUILDING, YOUTH TRAINING & DEVELOPMENT

The impacts of the COVID - 19 Pandemic has resulted in many live performances moving towards digital online spaces. Dance Film as a genre holds many possibilities for dance artists to present their work on screen, while live performance opportunities are limited. In this course, students investigated the medium of dance on film, exploring the impact of choreography, narrative, camera technology, editing styles, and music.

This task explored the choreographic and cinematic aspects of producing a dance for the camera. A dance for the camera is not a film/video document of a proscenium dance performance, but a synthesis between the various techniques of film/video and the act of choreography. This process encouraged students to expand the skills they developed in previous classes, and to focus on the difficult yet rewarding process of creative collaboration.

For their final project, students used personal media devices to make their own short dance film and reflect on the creative process. The final outcome of the workshop resulted in students reworking their solo performance material, towards the creation of a short dance film.
